Helpful Information and Need to Know Items

Food

Meals are available (not included with registration/camping fee) but can purchased in East Lodge during meal times. Although, we strongly encourage meals prepared at campsites as part of your outdoor camping experience. You may camp with Boy Scout troops and will the opportunity to observe and learn from these "seasoned campers." It

the opportunity to observe and learn from these "seasoned campers." It is suggested that you may want to contact the troop you will be camping with and arrange for meals to be prepared with the Boy Scouts. What a terrific learning experience!

Cooking

Dishes and other washing must be done in the campsite. There will be no running water at the camp. Please bring large containers with personal water. Some water will also be available at East Lodge. Proper cleaning of cooking and eating utensils is a must! Improper cleaning and rinsing can make you sick. If you're not comfortable with cooking and cleaning at camp, please "buddy up" with a troop who does know the proper way. Although it's not mandatory to camp with a troop, it is strongly suggested, especially if you're not used to camping and cooking outdoors. All packs will be placed with a troop unless they specify ahead of time that they want to camp alone. Stoves and lanterns using propane fuel may be used with adult supervision. No liquid fuels to start cooking fires or campfires.

Fires

Campsites are assigned to assure complete use of campsite space. Fire rings are shared, which can be a fun way to meet people. Fires can only be built in the fire rings, no ground fires outside the fire rings. Do NOT move the fire rings. Do NOT leave fires unattended; when extinguished, it must be cold to touch. Do not dig holes for fires or grease pits. Each Den provides its own fire protection, and "fire bucket." Next to the fire.

Leadership

Webelos must be under adult supervision at all times. The welfare of the individual Scout is the direct responsibility of the adult leaders and/or parents. It is the leader's responsibility to control the actions of his den, and organize free time activities for the boys. All Scouts and adult leaders should register with the Mohegan Council. Be friendly, courteous, patient, helpful, and considerate to the boys, parents, and staff members. The area you occupy is your "Camp Home" for the weekend. Den Leaders and Den Chiefs should participate with their boys in camp activities, such as openings, closings, campfire ,and special events.

Medical

Dr. Kate Robinson will be available the whole weekend for any medical emergencies and/or concerns. She can be found with her troop, #338, the "Readyman Station". Kate is a highly qualified doctor; although we would rather not have to use her skills this weekend. Please try and keep everyone safe.

What To Bring?

Webelos and their parent are advised to bring their Scouting Spirit!, as well as their tent, sleeping bags or bedding supplies, a towel, basic toiletry articles, water bottle or thermos, a warm

jacket and gloves, insect repellent, a flashlight, rain gear, the Class A (field) Webelos uniform for use on Saturday night, comfortable clothes, a hat, sturdy shoes and socks. ("Webelos Equipment" Listed separately.)

Remember, that October weather can be unpredictable and you should prepare your den for a cool, rainy weather camping experience. Please note that you may be sharing accommodations with other units so that we can serve more Scouts.

Do not bring firearms, sheathed knives, axes, hatchets, archery equipment, alcoholic beverages, glass containers, fireworks or pets.
